Description:

The Institute Vienna Circle (Friedrich Stadler) and the Vienna Forum for Analytic Philosophy (Dejan Makovec), together with the Hans Kelsen Institute and the ERC-Project "The Emergence of Relativism" host a three-day conference on Friedrich Waismann to take place in Vienna from the 15th to the 18th of September 2016. Waismann was a citizen of two worlds, the Vienna Circle before his emigration and the Oxonian ordinary language philosophy after his emigration, and came to be a prolific critic of both. Inspired by a first successful conference on Waismann – “Causality and Logical Positivism”, Vienna 2010 – the aim of this conference is to discuss the currency and variety of Waismann’s contributions to the field. Several slots are open for submitted papers.

Submission information:

The subject of invited submissions may be any aspect of Friedrich Waismann's philosophy or its historical or systematic bearing on other areas and disciplines. Systematic discussion (in the light of present debates) is sought, but also historical re-evaluations are welcome. Areas are only limited by the range of Waismann's philosophy and may hence lead from philosophy of language (open texture and language strata), logic, action (cf. Waismann’s *Will and Motive*), science (cf. McGuinness, ed., 2010, *Friedrich Waismann - Causality and Logical Positivism*), and mathematics, literary studies (cf. “A Philosopher Looks at Kafka”), moral philosophy (cf. “Ethics and Science”), Wittgenstein and Waismann, to Waismann's influence on other fields such as philosophy of law or meta-philosophy. New perspectives are most welcome.
